8. STATEMENT OF WORK

POSITION DESCRIPTION

BACKGROUND

The Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) is the office within USAID that is responsible for providing emergency non-food humanitarian assistance in response to international crises and disasters. OFDA is part of the Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance (DCHA) and is organized into three divisions. The Disaster Response and Mitigation Division (DRM) is responsible for the provision of emergency humanitarian assistance through a grants mechanism to non-governmental organizations (NGOs), international organizations (IOs) including the United Nations (UN) agencies, and to other partners to ensure the implementation and delivery of this assistance. This division also oversees OFDA's non-response efforts in disaster risk reduction. DRM also coordinates with other organizations for the provision of relief supplies and assistance. DRM devises, coordinates, and implements program strategies for a variety of natural and human-caused disaster situations. It encompasses a group of technical sector specialists who provide expert capability in assessing the quality of disaster response and disaster risk reduction activities. The Program Support Division (PS) provides programmatic and administrative support including budget/financial services, procurement planning and guidance, contracts and grants administration, and communication support for OFDA's Washington and field offices. The Operations Division (OPS) develops and manages logistical and operational support for disaster responses and administrative support to all offices and operations. OPS maintains readiness to respond to emergencies through several

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mechanisms, including managing Search and Rescue Teams (SAR), coordinating and supporting Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DARTs), and the Washington-based Response Management Teams (RMTs) as needed.

The Technical Assistance Group (TAG) within DRM was created in order to provide OFDA with a skilled cadre of technical experts in a variety of fields relevant to its disaster response and risk reduction activities. It is divided into a number of subgroups that include but is not limited to food security, health, gender and social context, protection and natural hazards.

INTRODUCTION

USAID has prioritized protection in all of its programming. The Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor will play a central role in the development and implementation of protection strategies for humanitarian assistance to internally displaced persons (IDPs) and other designated vulnerable groups for the Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA). The Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor will be a member of the Technical Assistance Group. Located within the Disaster Response and Mitigation Division (DRM), the Technical Assistance Group (TAG), was created in order to provide OFDA with a skilled cadre of technical experts in a variety of fields relevant to its disaster relief mandate. TAG is sub-divided into various groups that address Food Security, Shelter and Settlements, Health, Most Vulnerable Populations, and Natural Hazards groups. The incumbent will also play a central role in the implementation of U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) IDP and protection policies and coordination within USAID, and in conjunction with other U.S. Government (USG) agencies, donors, and non-governmental partners. The Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor will have substantial knowledge of current development and disaster theory and research regarding IDPs and protection, and practical experience in the field, working with private voluntary organizations (PVOs), non-governmental organizations (NGOs), or international organizations (IOs) at resettlement or disaster response locations.

OBJECTIVE

OFDA requires the services of a Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor to coordinate the Most Vulnerable Populations Team and to identify and assess humanitarian protection concerns in OFDA programming globally, coordinate the proposal review process and ongoing humanitarian research and programming to ensure that protection and “do no harm” principles are appropriately incorporated into their design and implementation.

9. CORE FUNCTIONAL AREAS OF RESPONSIBILITY

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor’s main role will be to coordinate the Vulnerable Populations Team within the Technical Assistance Group in DCHA/OFDA and others on humanitarian protection matters; analyze and report on trends; and monitor the impact of protection in humanitarian programming. Specific duties will include:

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- Provide technical advice and assistance for the analysis of protection, gender, diversity, and inclusion issues as they relate to humanitarian planning and programming. Support DRM and others in the humanitarian community, as appropriate, on humanitarian protection, gender equity, and disability issues for populations at risk.
- Provide administrative direction for the Vulnerable Populations Team, coordinate proposal reviews, specific protection proposals, operational research, and budgetary oversight over the project budget.
- Provide direction for the Agency on new and cutting edge methodologies and coordinate on policy issues within DCHA.
- Continually identify and assess the humanitarian assistance requirements of the victims, including target groups, their locations, and existing relief programs, and make recommendations for the types of humanitarian protection interventions that may be necessary.
- Serve as an active member of relevant working groups and develop tools to address protection issues such as lack of freedom of movement and forced return, as well as other serious protection issues.
- Prepare reports including situation reports, assessment reports and end of assignment reports, background documents, briefing papers, talking points, information memos, and other relevant protection-specific documents as necessary.
- In collaboration with other OFDA personnel, assist in preparation of briefing materials for senior OFDA management and USAID staff. Draft protection-focused guidelines, funding documents, position papers, and promotional materials on behalf of OFDA.
- Provide technical review of proposals, concept papers and other documents submitted by various partners, including NGOs, UN agencies, and other organizations.
- Oversee the monitoring of the work of DCHA/OFDA-funded United Nations (UN) organizations, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), private voluntary organizations (PVOs), international organizations (IOs), and other donors to ensure that identified humanitarian protection needs are met.
- Coordinate protection activities for DCHA/OFDA, collaborating with OFDA regional teams, USAID bureaus and missions and other US federal agencies.
- Oversee the Team's guidance to UN/IOs/NGOs/PVOs regarding OFDA guidelines for submitting grant proposals and reviewing submitted proposals.
- Travel to ongoing or developing disaster contexts to conduct assessments, identify, monitor, and evaluate projects, provide technical assistance in gender, protection and disability (PG&D) analysis, PG&D equality and PG&D integration.

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- Sign-up for and serve as needed, on Washington-based Response Management Teams (RMTs), which provides services and support to DARTs deployed in response to disasters. The duties on RMTs will be varied.
- Serve as the OFDA after-hours duty officer on a rotational basis, for approximately one week every six months.
- As needed, serve on Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DARTs) which may require immediate (within 24 hours) deployment overseas for an extended period of time.

SUPERVISORY RELATIONSHIP:

The Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor will take direction from and report directly to the Technical Assistance Group Team Leader or his/her designee.

SUPERVISORY CONTROLS:

The supervisor will provide administrative direction in terms of broadly defined goals and objectives. The incumbent is expected to take initiative and act independently with little direction and will have wide latitude for the exercise of independent judgment in responding to humanitarian protection needs; designing and carrying out programs, projects, studies or other work as part of the TAG. Results are considered authoritative and are normally accepted without significant change.

10. PHYSICAL DEMANDS

The work is generally sedentary and does not pose undue physical demands. During deployment on Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DARTs) (if required), and during site visits, there may be some additional physical exertion including long periods of standing, walking over rough terrain, or carrying of moderately heavy items (less than 50 pounds).

11. WORK ENVIRONMENT

Work is primarily performed in an office setting. During deployment on Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DARTs) (if required), and during site visits, the work may additionally involve special safety and/or security precautions, wearing of protective equipment, and exposure to severe weather conditions.

12. START DATE: Immediately, once necessary clearances are obtained.

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EDUCATION/EXPERIENCE REQUIRED FOR THIS POSITION

A Bachelor's degree with significant study in or pertinent to the specialized field or region (including but not limited to international law, economics, international relations and anthropology) and a minimum of nine (9) years of professional experience in USG foreign affairs agencies, international organizations, or NGOs specializing in one or more of the following: human rights protection, IDP and refugee issues, humanitarian relief, transitional justice/rule of law, conflict resolution or a closely related field. At least four (4) years must have been spent working specifically on conflict-affected populations, one (1) year of which must include on-the-ground field experience in needs assessment, analysis, emergency relief program operations or post-emergency rehabilitation.

OR

A Master's degree with significant study in or pertinent to the specialized field or region (including but not limited to international law, economics, international relations and anthropology) and a minimum of seven (7) years of professional experience in USG foreign affairs agencies, international organizations, or NGOs specializing in one or more of the following: human rights protection, IDP and refugee issues, humanitarian relief, transitional justice/rule of law, conflict resolution or a closely related field. At least three (3) years must have been spent working specifically on conflict-affected populations, one (1) year of which must include on-the-ground field experience in needs assessment, analysis, emergency relief program operations or post-emergency rehabilitation.

SELECTION FACTORS

- QRF #4 Describe your experience in interacting with a wide range of persons and organizations in a professional capacity as a protection advocate. Include details about your successful interactions with disaster-affected populations, local and/or national government officials in affected countries, UN agencies, non-governmental organizations, community-based organizations and local groups, and diplomats. Describe any strategies or approaches you have developed to work effectively with this wide range of individuals.

BASIS OF RATING: Applicants who meet the Education/Experience requirements and Selection Factors will be further evaluated based on scoring of the Quality Ranking Factor (QRF) responses. Those applicants determined to be competitively ranked may also be evaluated on interview performance and satisfactory professional reference checks.

Applicants are required to address each of the QRFs in a separate document describing specifically and accurately what experience, training, education and/or awards they have received that are relevant to each factor. 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ATTACHMENT 1

**ACQUISITION & ASSISTANCE POLICY DIRECTIVE (AAPD) NO. 06-10
PSC MEDICAL EXPENSE PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY**

General Provision 22, MEDICAL EXPENSE PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY
(OCTOBER 2006)

(a) Definitions. Terms used in this General Provision are defined in 16 FAM 116 available at <http://www.state.gov/m/a/dir/regs/fam/16fam/index.htm>.

Note: Personal services contractors are not eligible to participate in the Federal Employees Health Programs.

(b) The regulations in the Foreign Affairs Manual, Volume 16, Chapter 520 (16 FAM 520), Responsibility for Payment of Medical Expenses, apply to this contract, except as stated below. The contractor and each eligible family member are strongly encouraged to obtain health insurance that covers this assignment. Nothing in this provision supersedes or contradicts any other term or provision in this contract that pertains to insurance or medical costs, except that section (e) supplements General Provision 25. “MEDICAL EVACUATION (MEDEVAC) SERVICES.”

(c) When the contractor or eligible family member is covered by health insurance, that insurance is the primary payer for medical services provided to that contractor or eligible family member(s) both in the United States and abroad. The primary insurer’s liability is determined by the terms, conditions, limitations, and exclusions of the insurance policy. When the contractor or eligible family member is not covered by health insurance, the contractor is the primary payer for the total amount of medical costs incurred and the U.S. Government has no payment obligation (see paragraph (f) of this provision).

(d) USAID serves as a secondary payer for medical expenses of the contractor and eligible family members who are covered by health insurance, where the following conditions are met:

(1) The illness, injury, or medical condition giving rise to the expense is incurred, caused, or materially aggravated while the eligible individual is stationed or assigned abroad;

(2) The illness, injury, or medical condition giving rise to the expense required or requires hospitalization and the expense is directly related to the treatment of such illness, injury, or medical condition, including obstetrical care; and

(3) The Office of Medical Services (M/MED) or a Foreign Service medical provider (FSMP) determines that the treatment is appropriate for, and directly related to, the illness, injury, or medical condition.

(e) The Mission Director may, on the advice of M/MED or an FSMP at post, authorize medical travel for the contractor or an eligible family member in accordance with the General Provision 10, Travel and Transportation Expenses (July 1993), section (i) entitled “Emergency and Irregular Travel and Transportation.” In the event of a medical emergency, when time does not permit consultation, the Mission Director may issue a Travel Authorization Form or Medical Services Authorization Form DS-3067, provided that the FSMP or Post Medical Advisor (PMA) is notified as soon as possible

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following such an issuance. The contractor must promptly file a claim with his or her medevac insurance provider and repay to USAID any amount the medevac insurer pays for medical travel, up to the amount USAID paid under this section. The contractor must repay USAID for medical costs paid by the medevac insurer in accordance with sections (f) and (g) below. In order for medical travel to be an allowable cost under General Provision 10, the contractor must provide USAID written evidence that medevac insurance does not cover these medical travel costs.

(f) If the contractor or eligible family member is not covered by primary health insurance, the contractor is the primary payer for the total amount of medical costs incurred. In the event of a medical emergency, the Medical and Health Program may authorize issuance of Form DS-3067, Authorization for Medical Services for Employees and/or Dependents, to secure admission to a hospital located abroad for the uninsured contractor or eligible family member. In that case, the contractor will be required to reimburse USAID in full for funds advanced by USAID pursuant to the issuance of the authorization. The contractor may reimburse USAID directly or USAID may offset the cost from the contractor's invoice payments under this contract, any other contract the individual has with the U.S. Government, or through any other available debt collection mechanism.

(g) When USAID pays medical expenses (e.g., pursuant to Form DS-3067, Authorization for Medical Services for Employees and/or Dependents), repayment must be made to USAID either by insurance payment or directly by the contractor, except for the amount of such expenses USAID is obligated to pay under this provision. The Contracting Officer will determine the repayment amount in accordance with the terms of this provision and the policies and procedures for employees contained in 16 FAM 521. When USAID pays the medical expenses, including medical travel costs (see section (e) above), of an individual (either the contractor or an eligible family member) who is covered by insurance, that individual promptly must claim his or her benefits under any applicable insurance policy or policies. As soon as the individual receives the insurance payment, the contractor must reimburse USAID for the full amount that USAID paid on the individual's behalf or the repayment amount determined by the Contracting Officer in accordance with this paragraph, whichever is less. If an individual is not covered by insurance, the contractor must reimburse USAID for the entire amount of all medical expenses and any travel costs the contractor receives from his/her medevac provider.

(h) In the event that the contractor or eligible family member fails to recover insurance payments or transfer the amount of such payments to USAID within 90 days, USAID will take appropriate action to collect the payments due, unless such failure is for reasons beyond the control of the USPSC/dependent.

(i) Before departing post or terminating the contract, the contractor must settle all medical expense and medical travel costs. If the contractor is insured, he or she must provide proof to the Contracting Officer that those insurance claims have been submitted to the insurance carrier(s) and sign a repayment agreement to repay to USAID any amounts paid by the insurance carrier(s).

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ATTACHMENT 2

FAR 52.222-50 COMBATING TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS (FEB 2009).

(a) *Definitions.* As used in this clause—

“Coercion” means—

- (1) Threats of serious harm to or physical restraint against any person;
- (2) Any scheme, plan, or pattern intended to cause a person to believe that failure to perform an act would result in serious harm to or physical restraint against any person; or
- (3) The abuse or threatened abuse of the legal process.

“Commercial sex act” means any sex act on account of which anything of value is given to or received by any person.

“Debt bondage” means the status or condition of a debtor arising from a pledge by the debtor of his or her personal services or of those of a person under his or her control as a security for debt, if the value of those services as reasonably assessed is not applied toward the liquidation of the debt or the length and nature of those services are not respectively limited and defined.

“Employee” means an employee of the Contractor directly engaged in the performance of work under the contract who has other than a minimal impact or involvement in contract performance.

“Forced Labor” means knowingly providing or obtaining the labor or services of a person—

- (1) By threats of serious harm to, or physical restraint against, that person or another person;
- (2) By means of any scheme, plan, or pattern intended to cause the person to believe that, if the person did not perform such labor or services, that person or another person would suffer serious harm or physical restraint; or
- (3) By means of the abuse or threatened abuse of law or the legal process.

“Involuntary servitude” includes a condition of servitude induced by means of—

- (1) Any scheme, plan, or pattern intended to cause a person to believe that, if the person did not enter into or continue in such conditions, that person or another person would suffer serious harm or physical restraint; or
- (2) The abuse or threatened abuse of the legal process.

“Severe forms of trafficking in persons” means—

- (1) Sex trafficking in which a commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; or
- (2) The recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.

“Sex trafficking” means the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act.

(b) *Policy.* The United States Government has adopted a zero tolerance policy regarding trafficking in persons. Contractors and contractor employees shall not—

- (1) Engage in severe forms of trafficking in persons during the period of performance of the contract;

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- (2) Procure commercial sex acts during the period of performance of the contract; or
- (3) Use forced labor in the performance of the contract.

(c) *Contractor requirements.* The Contractor shall—

- (1) Notify its employees of—
 - (i) The United States Government’s zero tolerance policy described in paragraph (b) of this clause; and
 - (ii) The actions that will be taken against employees for violations of this policy. Such actions may include, but are not limited to, removal from the contract, reduction in benefits, or termination of employment; and
- (2) Take appropriate action, up to and including termination, against employees or subcontractors that violate the policy in paragraph (b) of this clause.

(d) *Notification.* The Contractor shall inform the Contracting Officer immediately of—

- (1) Any information it receives from any source (including host country law enforcement) that alleges a Contractor employee, subcontractor, or subcontractor employee has engaged in conduct that violates this policy; and
- (2) Any actions taken against Contractor employees, subcontractors, or subcontractor employees pursuant to this clause.

(e) *Remedies.* In addition to other remedies available to the Government, the Contractor’s failure to comply with the requirements of paragraphs (c), (d), or (f) of this clause may result in—

- (1) Requiring the Contractor to remove a Contractor employee or employees from the performance of the contract;
- (2) Requiring the Contractor to terminate a subcontract;
- (3) Suspension of contract payments;
- (4) Loss of award fee, consistent with the award fee plan, for the performance period in which the Government determined Contractor non-compliance;
- (5) Termination of the contract for default or cause, in accordance with the termination clause of this contract; or
- (6) Suspension or debarment.

(f) *Subcontracts.* The Contractor shall include the substance of this clause, including this paragraph (f), in all subcontracts.

(g) *Mitigating Factor.* The Contracting Officer may consider whether the Contractor had a Trafficking in Persons awareness program at the time of the violation as a mitigating factor when determining remedies.
