POSITION DESCRIPTION

BACKGROUND

The Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) is the office within USAID that is responsible for providing emergency non-food humanitarian assistance in response to international crises and disasters. OFDA is part of the Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance (DCHA) and is organized into six divisions.

The Africa and the Asia, Latin America, Europe (ALE) Divisions are responsible for the provision of emergency humanitarian assistance through a grants mechanism to non-governmental organizations (NGOs), international organizations (IOs) including the United Nations (UN) agencies and to other partners to ensure the implementation and delivery of this assistance. These Divisions also oversee OFDA's non-response efforts in disaster risk reduction and resilience. Africa and ALE also coordinate with other organizations for the provision of relief supplies and assistance. They devise, coordinate and implement program strategies for a variety of natural and human caused disaster situations. Both Divisions encompass groups of technical sector specialists who provide technical expert capability in assessing the quality of disaster response and risk reduction activities.

The Operations Division (OPS) develops and manages logistical and operational support for disaster responses and administrative support to all offices and operations. OPS maintains readiness to respond to emergencies through several mechanisms, including managing Search and Rescue Teams (SAR), coordinating and supporting Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DARTs), and Washington-based Response Management Teams (RMTs), to ensure OFDA's capacity to execute and coordinate U.S. Government (USG) humanitarian assistance and response to natural disasters and complex emergencies. OPS performs these functions through

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four teams, namely, the Disaster Assistance Support Team (DASP), Operations Support Team (OST), Overseas Administration Team (OAT), and the Military Liaison Team (MLT). OPS provides technical guidance and expertise in Disaster Logistics, Search and Rescue, Operations Center Management, Military Liaison, and Consequence Management. It also provides overseas support to OFDA offices and personnel and to other sectors necessary to ensure OFDA's capacity to execute and coordinate USG humanitarian assistance and response to natural disasters and complex emergencies.

The Program Support (PS) Division provides operational management support, including general administration, budget and financial services, procurement planning, information technology (IT), human resources management including staff care, and contract and grant administration support to OFDA. The PS Division supports OFDA's mandate by providing innovative solutions for IT, staffing, funds control, budgeting, information and human resource management, and procurement to facilitate timely disaster responses.

The Preparation, Strategic Planning and Mitigation (PSPM) Division is responsible for the technical oversight of all OFDA response and mitigation programs, as well as preparation and strategic planning for response, mitigation, and disaster risk reduction activities. The PSPM Division houses technical experts in all sectors potentially affected by disasters, and leads the Agency in developing and promoting best practices for programming in these specific sectors. In addition, PSPM will be the focal point for technological innovations for humanitarian assistance in areas such as monitoring and evaluation, assessment, and information management.

The Humanitarian Policy and Global Engagement (HPGE) Division assists the DCHA front office, the OFDA Director and OFDA Deputy Director with tracking trends and policy developments in the humanitarian assistance field. It engages in policy dialogue with other parts of USAID, the USG interagency, other donors, multilateral agencies, and NGO partners; recommends strategies for action to DCHA; initiates development of policy and internal guidance for OFDA; maintains global relationships with implementing partners, other donors, and the broader humanitarian architecture; engages with the U.N. to advance USG humanitarian policy objectives and to promote humanitarian principles within the USG and internationally. The HPGE Division leads OFDA's communications and social media outreach to effectively communicate OFDA's story to a variety of strategic audiences; and serves as the office's primary interlocutor on strategic issues with other federal partners to provide guidance to OFDA on policy issues pertaining to the interagency, and to improve USG humanitarian coordination and response during large-scale crises. The HPGE Division has staff that manage global programs, policy and outreach, strategic communications, and interagency engagement. The HPGE Division also includes Humanitarian Advisors located in Rome, Geneva, and United States Mission to the UN in New York.

INTRODUCTION

The Preparation, Strategic Planning and Mitigation (PSPM) Division was created in order to provide OFDA with a skilled cadre of technical experts in a variety of fields relevant to its disaster relief mandate. PSPM is sub-divided into various groups that address Food Security, Shelter and Settlements, Health, Most Vulnerable Populations, and Natural Hazards groups.

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USAID has prioritized protection in all of its programming. The Senior Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and Protection Advisor will be a member of the Protection, Gender and Disability (PGD) Team located within the PSPM Division and will play a central role in the development and implementation of strategies for the protection of disaster-affected populations, including women, children and other designated vulnerable groups for OFDA. The Senior GBV and Protection Advisor will have substantial knowledge of current development and disaster theory and research regarding humanitarian protection, particularly GBV and child protection, and practical experience in the field, working with private voluntary organizations (PVOs), NGOs, or IOs in humanitarian action. The USPSC will also have substantial experience working across and between agencies on humanitarian protection in order to establish common priorities and advance shared or complementary objectives.

OBJECTIVE

OFDA requires the services of a Senior GBV and Protection Advisor to work closely with other members of the PGD Team, and the staff of the HPGE Division. The Senior GBV and Protection Advisor will be an advisor to OFDA on program issues and implementation regarding protection, internally displaced persons, and other vulnerable populations, with a particular focus on GBV in humanitarian settings.

9. CORE FUNCTIONAL AREAS OF RESPONSIBILITY

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The position involves providing expert analytical and advisory support for the planning, development and execution of USAID programs and policies relating to protection, in humanitarian contexts, particularly GBV. The work includes providing expert advice and guidance to the decisions and actions of OFDA regional teams, as well as senior level officials, and quickly, accurately, and decisively determining the significance of information to OFDA's protection work. As part of this effort, the advisor must be able to rapidly identify and anticipate problem issues, help formulate strategic and programming priorities, and write under tight deadlines to produce products that represent assessments of complex issues. The work requires extremely strong writing, and verbal skills.

The position will involve extensive collaboration and coordination with other offices/ bureaus and agencies within and outside of the USG for the purposes of integrating technical rigor into program planning and policy implementation efforts. Primary contacts will be with the Department of State, particularly the Bureau of Populations, Refugees & Migration (PRM) , and USAID employees at all levels, including other DCHA offices, the USAID Office of the Senior Coordinator for Gender, the and US Missions to the UN. The position will also require collaboration with UN staff, representatives of other donor governments, consultants, researchers and educators, and officials of NGOs. Contacts occur in a wide variety of planned and unplanned, formal and informal settings in Washington, foreign capitals, and in the field.

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The position will also involve development and management of global projects and initiatives, intended to advance learning, address capacity gaps, or further policy priorities related to GBV and other protection priorities, on behalf of the PGD Team, often in close coordination with the HPGE Division, staff of other Offices, Bureaus, or Departments or external partners.

Responsibilities and duties include:

- Serve as an expert source of information on and analysis of GBV and other humanitarian protection issues for OFDA. Provide expertise for the identification, research, analysis and development of recommendations on all issues and matters relating to humanitarian protection, particularly gender-based violence, child protection, and/or psychosocial support;
- Prepare OFDA senior management and DCHA senior leadership, when necessary, to speak on GBV and other protection issues before UN bodies, NGOs, Congress, other parts of the USG, and media;
- Develop and maintain cooperative working relationships with UN agencies, NGOs, coordination bodies, and relevant USG offices working on GBV and other protection issues in humanitarian settings;
- Coordinate with the State Department's PRM regarding the development of strategies addressing protection of disaster-affected populations, particularly GBV;
- Respond to relevant congressional and public inquiries and speak to various visiting groups about protection of disaster affected populations;
- Improve awareness and expertise of OFDA staff on protection issues. Assist OFDA with better integration of protection issues into normal humanitarian programs;
- Coordinate with other members of the PGD Team and OFDA/HPGE staff in the development of internal protection policies, strategies, and program standards;
- Based on analysis and research, advise and communicate about USAID's leadership role within the USG in relation to protection issues, particularly gender-based violence, including providing country-specific recommendations on how to address protection needs;
- Coordinate with the various DCHA offices, including the Office of Transitions Initiatives (OTI), Office of Food for Peace (FFP), of the Center of Excellence on Democracy, Human Rights and Governance (DRG), Office of Conflict Management and Mitigation (CMM) and Office of Program, Policy, and Management (PPM) on Protection issues;
- Work with counterparts in other donor organizations to exchange information, establish meetings, solicit publications, and collect information on training opportunities regarding protection;

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- Articulate relevant protection policies, particularly as they relate to the prevention and response to GBV, to personnel within OFDA, the DCHA Bureau, USAID Missions and other USAID Bureaus, and to other USG agencies, other donors, and implementing partners, through participation in conferences, speaking engagements, and field visits;
- Participate in OFDA grant review process as needed, including reviewing partner proposals and providing technical recommendations;
- Assist OFDA staff to translate policies and strategies into effective programming, as needed;
- Travel to the field as needed, sometimes on short notice, for possible durations of several weeks;
- Serve as OFDA Duty Officer on a rotational basis;
- Serve as a member of the Washington-based RMT, which provides services and support to DARTs deployed in response to disasters. The duties on the RMT Team will be varied.

SUPERVISORY RELATIONSHIP:

The USPSC will report to the Senior Humanitarian Protection Advisor, within the PSPM Division, and will coordinate on a regular basis with the staff of the HPGE Division particularly the Policy Team Leader.

SUPERVISORY CONTROLS:

Supervisor provides administrative directions in terms of broadly defined missions or functions. The USPSC independently plans, designs and carries out programs, projects, studies or other work. Results are considered authoritative and are normally accepted without significant change.

10. PHYSICAL DEMANDS

The work is generally sedentary and does not pose undue physical demands. During deployment on DARTs (if required), and during site visits, there may be some additional physical exertion including long periods of standing, walking over rough terrain, or carrying of moderately heavy items (less than 50 pounds).

11. WORK ENVIRONMENT

Work is primarily performed in an office setting. During deployment on DARTs (if required), and during site visits, the work may additionally involve special safety and/or security precautions, wearing of protective equipment, and exposure to severe weather conditions.

12. START DATE: Immediately, once necessary clearances are obtained.

Master's degree with significant study in or pertinent to the specialized field including, but not limited to, social work, public health, international relations, international law, economics, anthropology or a related field, and seven (7) years of professional experience working within a USG foreign affairs agency, PVO/NGO and/or IO in humanitarian assistance and/or immediate post-conflict environments with a focus on displaced persons, which must include three (3) years of on-the-ground field experience.

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QRF #3 Discuss your view on how protection, gender and diversity considerations, and analysis can be more effectively integrated into humanitarian assessments and program development, implementation, and monitoring across sectors, from the start of an emergency onwards.

QRF #4 Describe your experience in interacting with a wide range of persons and organizations in a professional capacity as a protection advocate. Include details about your successful interactions with disaster-affected populations, local and/or national government officials in affected countries, UN agencies, NGOs, community-based organizations and local groups, and diplomats. Describe any strategies or approaches you have developed to work effectively with this wide range of individuals.

BASIS OF RATING: Applicants who meet the Education/Experience requirements and Selection Factors will be further evaluated based on scoring of the QRF responses. Those applicants determined to be competitively ranked may also be evaluated on interview performance and satisfactory professional reference checks.

Applicants are required to address each of the QRFs in a separate document describing specifically and accurately what experience, training, and/or education they have received as it pertains to each factor. Be sure to include your name and the announcement number at the top of each additional page. Failure to address the selection factors and/or Quality Ranking Factors may result in not receiving credit for all pertinent experience, education, and/or training.

The most qualified candidates may be interviewed and required to provide a writing sample. OFDA will not pay for any expenses associated with the interviews. **ACQUISITION AND ASSISTANCE POLICY DIRECTIVE (AAPD) NO. 06-10
PSC MEDICAL EXPENSE PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY**

General Provision 22, MEDICAL EXPENSE PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY
(OCTOBER 2006)

(a) Definitions. Terms used in this General Provision are defined in 16
FAM 116 available at <http://www.state.gov/m/a/dir/regs/fam/c23002.htm>.

Note: Personal services contractors are not eligible to participate in the Federal Employees Health Programs.

(b) The regulations in the Foreign Affairs Manual, Volume 16, Chapter 520 (16 FAM 520), Responsibility for Payment of Medical Expenses, apply to this contract, except as stated below. The contractor and each eligible family member are strongly encouraged to obtain health insurance that covers this assignment. Nothing in this provision supersedes or contradicts any other term or provision in this contract that pertains to insurance or medical costs, except that section (e) supplements General Provision 25. "MEDICAL EVACUATION (MEDEVAC) SERVICES."

(c) When the contractor or eligible family member is covered by health insurance, that insurance is the primary payer for medical services provided to that contractor or eligible family member(s) both in the United States and abroad. The primary insurer's liability is determined by the terms, conditions, limitations, and exclusions of the insurance policy. When the contractor or eligible family member is not covered by health insurance, the contractor is the primary payer for the total amount of medical costs incurred and the U.S. Government has no payment obligation (see paragraph (f) of this provision).

(d) USAID serves as a secondary payer for medical expenses of the contractor and eligible family members who are covered by health insurance, where the following conditions are met:

(1) The illness, injury, or medical condition giving rise to the expense is incurred, caused, or materially aggravated while the eligible individual is stationed or assigned abroad;

(2) The illness, injury, or medical condition giving rise to the expense required or requires hospitalization and the expense is directly related to the treatment of such illness, injury, or medical condition, including obstetrical care; and

(3) The Office of Medical Services (M/MED) or a Foreign Service medical provider (FSMP) determines that the treatment is appropriate for, and directly related to, the illness, injury, or medical condition.

(e) The Mission Director may, on the advice of M/MED or an FSMP at post, authorize medical travel for the contractor or an eligible family member in accordance with the General Provision 10, Travel and Transportation Expenses (July 1993), section (i) entitled "Emergency and Irregular Travel and Transportation." In the event of a medical emergency, when time does not

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permit consultation, the Mission Director may issue a Travel Authorization Form or Medical Services Authorization Form DS-3067, provided that the FSMP or Post Medical Advisor (PMA) is notified as soon as possible following such an issuance. The contractor must promptly file a claim with his or her medevac insurance provider and repay to USAID any amount the medevac insurer pays for medical travel, up to the amount USAID paid under this section. The contractor must repay USAID for medical costs paid by the medevac insurer in accordance with sections (f) and (g) below. In order for medical travel to be an allowable cost under General Provision 10, the contractor must provide USAID written evidence that medevac insurance does not cover these medical travel costs.

(f) If the contractor or eligible family member is not covered by primary health insurance, the contractor is the primary payer for the total amount of medical costs incurred. In the event of a medical emergency, the Medical and Health Program may authorize issuance of Form DS-3067, Authorization for Medical Services for Employees and/or Dependents, to secure admission to a hospital located abroad for the uninsured contractor or eligible family member. In that case, the contractor will be required to reimburse USAID in full for funds advanced by USAID pursuant to the issuance of the authorization. The contractor may reimburse USAID directly or USAID may offset the cost from the contractor's invoice payments under this contract, any other contract the individual has with the U.S. Government, or through any other available debt collection mechanism.

(g) When USAID pays medical expenses (e.g., pursuant to Form DS-3067, Authorization for Medical Services for Employees and/or Dependents), repayment must be made to USAID either by insurance payment or directly by the contractor, except for the amount of such expenses USAID is obligated to pay under this provision. The Contracting Officer will determine the repayment amount in accordance with the terms of this provision and the policies and procedures for employees contained in 16 FAM 521. When USAID pays the medical expenses, including medical travel costs (see section (e) above), of an individual (either the contractor or an eligible family member) who is covered by insurance, that individual promptly must claim his or her benefits under any applicable insurance policy or policies. As soon as the individual receives the insurance payment, the contractor must reimburse USAID for the full amount that USAID paid on the individual's behalf or the repayment amount determined by the Contracting Officer in accordance with this paragraph, whichever is less. If an individual is not covered by insurance, the contractor must reimburse USAID for the entire amount of all medical expenses and any travel costs the contractor receives from his/her medevac provider.

(h) In the event that the contractor or eligible family member fails to recover insurance payments or transfer the amount of such payments to USAID within 90 days, USAID will take appropriate action to collect the payments due, unless such failure is for reasons beyond the control of the USPSC/dependent.

(i) Before departing post or terminating the contract, the contractor must settle all medical expense and medical travel costs. If the contractor is insured, he or she must provide proof to the Contracting Officer that those insurance claims have been submitted to the insurance carrier(s) and sign a repayment agreement to repay to USAID any amounts paid by the insurance carrier(s).
